Vale Matte Dunn

Whilst Matte last played in tournaments in Victoria in 2018, many players throughout Australia will remember Matte who had played for many years previously.

He won the Queensland Championship in 2006 and was part of the Australian team in 2014 for the Trans Tasman Challenge. Few knew that he had a troubled life and was for most of his life homeless and sleeping rough. He was friendly and generous in helping those new to Scrabble. There was another side to Matte, He sought to raise himself out of homelessness and in 2015 gained a BA.

Australian Master/State Challenge

Forty of Australia's best players gathered in the Lawson Room of the Revesby Workers Club on the first weekend of September to contest both the Australian Masters and the State Challenge.

Report by Bob Jackman

An unforeseen no-show by a NSW player in the State Challenge ensured there would be no bye in that event while at the same time giving NSW zero chance of taking the team award. Ironically the local stand-in player Chris Ostrowski has already been seconded to the WA team, with Chris going on to be the individual winner from Jane Brown (QLD) and Dianne Brumby (TAS). The coveted team award went to Queensland, with team comprising with Jane Brown, Liz Blanch and Sheryl Davidson.

The Masters was a hard fought battle with Naween Fernando (VIC) leading for the most of the way, but then being pipped on the post by Edward Okulicz (VIC). Naween still managed second place with Esther Perrins (NSW) finished strongly to take third place.

Both Edward and Naween had been in Sydney just over a week earlier to attend the funeral of their close friend Chris May, so the result was a fitting one. Edward spoke in honour of Chris prior to the presentation of the awards for the best words starting with **C H R I S M A Y**. Two of these words were the highest scoring words in their events – Rob Hutchinson's **SNAZZIER** for 194 (Team Challenge) and Joanne Craig's **APEHOODS** for 185 (Masters)

Around the States

ACT

Scrabble ACT hosted tournaments in September, October and November.

There were 8 games in the September 16 Tournament with 14 players. The winner was Noel Barrett, with Alex Boiko in 2nd place and John Spaan in 3rd. The high game went to Noel Barrett (616) and the high word to Susan MacGillivray for **JUNGLES** (110).

Congratulations to Vincent Nguyen, Noel Barrett, Lexia Smallwood and Rebecca Hill who all achieved their highest ever rating on the day.

Ten players competed in 8 games in the October 22 Tournament. Place-getters were Noel Barret (1st), John Spaan (2nd) and Tim Reddan (3rd). Prizes also went to Tim Reddan for high game (592) and Owen Randall for high word (ADJOINED 203). Rebecca Hill had the highest rating gain of +35.

The 2023 ACT Championship Tournament was held on 18 and 19 November, with 15 games being played across the two days.

Of the 11 players, Ryan Sutton (who travelled from Sydney for the tournament) won 14 games, which earned him 1st place. 2nd place went to Noel Barrett and 3rd to Ronnie Bennett. Owen Randall won the lower rating band prize. High game went to Ryan Sutton (620) and the high word to Noel Barrett for **MALIGNED** (158). Arlene Williams had the highest rating gain of +62.

New South Wales

Matchplay Progress

Both Matchplays have reached the same stage with only the final playoffs to take place to determine the respective winners. In B Division, Peter Griffiths defeated Josie Mally 5 games to 3 to qualify while Steven Savona also defeated Sharon Sorensen 5 games to 3 to also qualify for the final. In A Division Joanne Craig and Esther Perrins are set to contest the final.

Hybrid Events

Scrabble NSW will be trialling hybrid events commencing with the JanBoree. This is to

cater for the needs of those who have decided they no longer wish to play to CSW19, or any lexicon containing slur words. Those players will need to nominate this preference at entry, and once nominated all their opponents will be required to play CSW22.

Tournament Round Up

The major event of the quarter was the NSW Championship, staged over three days at Revesby Workers Club. Edward Okulicz from Victoria joined us again and just as for Australian Masters (see report elsewhere) and took out the honours with 17 wins out of the 24 games. Esther Perrins was one win back and Victor Tung snared 3rd with highest spread in a group with 15 wins.

Two weeks later we moved to Burwood for the annual Spring Marathon, an open event of 11 games of 20 minutes per player duration. Three players finished on 8 wins, separated by spread. They were Ryan Sutton (winner), Rod Talbot (runner-up) and Bob Jackman (third).

The next scheduled event was Lake Macquarie, but a serious accident sustained by your editor and event organiser (Richard Birch) caused the cancellation of the event.

A replacement event was hastily organised by the writer at a new venue, Roseville RSL. The venue turned out to be adequate for the 23 players in attendance, most taking advantage of the lunch subsidy.

Scrabble couple Rod Talbot and Jyoti Chandna took the honours in A Division with Rod winning all his games. In B Division three players finished on 6 wins, but honours went to Sue Fullerton who had the highest score. Josie Mally and junior player Ryder Lo filled the other two placings.

Jack Bell, a young local playing only his second tournament, provided valuable assistance on the day and showed a willingness to learn the organisational aspects of running Scrabble tournaments. It is hoped we see more of him.

Another player we hope to see more of is Josh Watt, a teacher on the Central Coast. Josh achieved a rating of over 1300 at his first event, the Central Coast tournament held on Nov 26th. Again Rod Talbot and Jyoti Chandna filled the top two placings, this time with 7 wins each.

Queensland

Cameron Farlow is the Queensland Champion following the Championship held at Coorparoo in August. Second was Nick Ivanoski (Victoria) and third was Julie Brice who made the trip down from Townsville.

Cameron Farlow has been Queensland Champion nine times - every year since 2012 except for 2013 and 2016 when Alastair Richards took the championship. It was pleasing to have 34 participants this year with entries from New Zealand, Victoria, New South Wales and regional Queensland. The award for the Queensland member with the highest rating gain over the last year was presented to Gail Hamilton from Townsville. Second was our youth player, Ashwin Page.

The Queensland Championships was also the commencement of earning points towards the Queensland Tournament Player and Club of the Year awards that will be presented at the Queensland Championships each coming year. As of 20th November, the top three clubs are Coorparoo (109 points), Toowoomba (79 points), and Southport (76 points). The three highest placed individuals are Cameron Farlow and Karen Richards (both on 44 points), and Olga Visser (33 points). Points are gained from placings in divisions or rating

bands in any rated tournament worldwide. First - 10 points, second - 8 points, third - 6 points, fourth - 4 points, fifth – 3 points, novice player – 5 points, provisional rated player – 3 points, any other player – 1 point.

A new public Facebook Group – Queensland Scrabble Hub has been set up to complement the Scrabble Queensland page. It is hoped that the group will encourage more interaction between those interested in scrabble in Queensland.

A fundraising tournament was held to support Ashwin Page going to Thailand to represent Australia at the WESPA Youth Cup. The event had a social section with about a dozen people trying out scrabble. Many of these people came from the scout group Ashwin attends. We had two novices start at that tournament, and two more in the tournaments following it.

On the international front, we wish Queenslander Ashwin Page (and the other Australian Players) good fortune in the WESPA Youth Cup being held in Thailand. A contingent of five Queenslanders recently returned from Malta and the Seniors World Championship. Olga Visser came second in the over 80 section. Other attendees were Karrin Henderson, Arnold Appelhof, Karen Richards, and Paul Richards.

Border Challenge Report

Each year in November since 2010, Victoria and South Australia meet for the Border Challenge. This year it was South Australia's turn to organize the event and rather than meet half way on the Duke's Highway in Horsham we decided to vary it a bit and try Mount Gambier.

So how do you go about organizing a venue for a two day tournament with nearby accommodation and restaurants remotely? Ring the Information Service of course. Not only did they suggest a venue but also informed me that the U3A ran a Scrabble group in Mount Gambier. Judy Mansfield previously provided an article for Across the Board where she described our trip to the Victorian Championships in June via Mount Gambier to check out the Mason's Lodge, the suggested venue.

This antiquated 1950s building proved to be an ideal location for a tournament with suitable tables and chairs and a great break out area and only \$250 hire fee for the weekend. It is also located right next door to a motel, with another across the road and surrounded by shops and restaurants.

Most competitors travelled down on the Friday so a group dinner was booked at Mac's Hotel just down the street from the venue. The food was good, reasonably priced and they provided us with their private parlour room as well.

Play started in the ten game tournament after lunch on Saturday and South Australia got ahead to an early lead which Victoria could not catch up, eventually winning the championship board, for the fifth time in a row, 88 games to 41. There were 17 players from South Australia and 13 from Victoria but the games where a South Australian played against another from South Australia were not counted in the final tally.

Three members from the U3A Scrabble group dropped in during the afternoon and observed how a tournament runs. They also watched a game between myself and Rob Hutchinson and Rob very graciously did not mind a bit of explanation regarding rules and protocols. They are now going to list their club on the South Australian web site so the contact had a good outcome.

We played 6 games before dinner and enjoyed a range of pizzas, garlic bread, and icecream before playing the 7th game of the day. On Sunday morning we played the last 3 games with most competitors setting out for the long drive home, but a few stayed on for some sightseeing making a holiday of it.

Carmel Dodd took out the competition with a ten game straight tally. Adam Kretschmer came second and Jane Taylor third. There were also prizes in the bottom half and Suzanne Healy came first, Emmanuel Atsas second and Paula Messer third. Carol Johnsen won the prize for the best player from the losing state. Angie Pearse won high word with 149 for dearness and Susan Roberts won the high word for the bottom half with 102 for pithiest. Helen Jones won high game in the bottom half with 612 and Carmel Dodd in the top half with 557.

There were also bars of chocolate for the highest scoring word starting with the letters of BORDER. Helen Jones scored 75 points for beatier, Wendi Symes scored 101 points for oversew, Barry Harridge scored 91 points for roadies, Angie Pearse scored 149 for dearness, Rob Hutchinson scored 89 points for enamored and Paula Messer scored 100 points for shearer (ending in r).

It was a great weekend and it is nice to be on the same team as your usual competitors. We did our bit for the economy of Mount Gambier and look forward to what Victoria organizes for next year.

A little bit about my Club games

In a fit of tidying up I went through my score sheets for my 2022 Club games. We play each Wednesday night and, during 2022, I played a couple of Thursday mornings (mostly because I was in paid employment and couldn't get to Thursdays unless I was holidaying). On Wednesday night play goes from 7:00 pm to 10:00 pm and I generally played five games each night.

Over the whole of the calendar year, I played 222 games against twelve different opponents and won 176 (79.3%), lost 45 (20.3%), and drew once (0.5%). My results table is below:

This is a bit better than my tournament results where, over several years, I have played 1,192 games with only 597 wins (50.1%), 592 losses (49.7%), and 3 draws (0.3%). But this can be partially put down to the higher ratings of my tournament opponents.

Over these games, I played 291 valid bonus words and seven phony bonuses (2.3%) that weren't challenged – an average of 1.3 valid bonus words per game. The thing that surprised me was the nature of my bonus plays.

Of my valid bonuses, I played 202 sevens, 88 eights, and one nine (QUIETENED in case you're interested). 216 of my bonus plays (74%) contained the letter "S" and I played

mostly unique bonus words. I only repeated eleven words over all my games during the 2022 year: DILATES; EXPIRES; INGATES; INTONED; RELATED; RESTING; RUTTIEST; SERIATE; SORTIES; TRIAGES; UNITIES.

Each of these words I played on two occasions but no other words were repeated. I also tended to not play many anagrams. For example, although I played **INGATES** twice, I didn't play any of its six anagrams once (I'm learning them again).

Only 66 words (23%) were in Zyzzva's top 1,000 probability words. Given that the CSW19 lexicon is 279,496 words, these top words might be overrepresented in my games but calculating the correct statistical comparison is beyond me (word frequency versus letter frequency probabilities are apples and oranges I think).

I guess it also raises the difference between difficulty of finding bonuses and the probability of the word occurring randomly on one's rack. My least probable bonus according to Zyzzva was **CLIMBING**. This would not appear to be a hard word to find even though one had to find a letter on the board to play through. Unlike the most probable letter combination that I played – **NOTAIRE (OTARINE** – not played) which is what I would call a Scrabble-only word (I

guess I rarely need to find a French official to attest or certify my documents – or discuss matters concerning the eared seal). I note that **OBVIOUS** (a bonus word that I played) is 23,651 on the probability list is less probable than **ZONATED** (the only bonus starting with zed that I played) which comes in at 3,112.

As it happens 122 of the bonuses that I played (42%) had no anagram. A further 80 (27%) had only one anagram – often one I would call regular and the other not. For example, **EXPIRES** which I played twice also yields **PREXIES** which I didn't play at all. Similarly with **INTONED** and **NOINTED**. I played **LOFTIER** but never **TREFOIL**; **TOROIDS** but not **DISROOT**; **DEIGNED** but not **DEEDING**. I really need to get into this anagramming business.

Also, I do try to have more fun in Club play and may risk words that I wouldn't in a tournament (often to my regret). What do you get from Club play?
